


Resource & Referrals

In 2023, our Resource Specialists answered 6,235 calls, emails, and social media requests. These are families new to Autism starting to navigate systems are looking for help. In 2022, we continued to see an increase of individuals in crisis homelessness, law enforcement or CFS being called, or extreme behavior in the home.

Our Resource Specialists were there and spent the time it took to resolve the issues - sometimes hours for one family.



Advocacy

Everyone deserves to live fully. At the core of the Autism Society's work is our goal to influence meaningful change in support of the Autism community.

Our community, like the rest of society focused on reintegrating after COVID. The workforce shortage had a critical impact on our community creating issues with not enough staff in special education, respite and day services, being able to assess medical professionals for a new diagnosis and medical treatment. The Autism Society Inland Empire continued to lead a advocacy's efforts and collaborate with other disability organizations to address:


- Need for new and innovative programs to address the unmet needs of our community
- Surveyed over 1,000 families and published a report on the disparity issuers in special education.
- Faciliated two focus groups with DDS on the implementation of social recreation services
- Focus group and report on the need for crisis services for families who have children and adults with severe behavior
- Attended countless state workgroup meetings and gave public input on a variety of issues including those on behavioral health, employment, safety net services, new Regional Center Performance Measures an Purchase of Services disparities.

Our Initiatives: Access for the Latino and Spanish Speaking Communities

CLASE Community of Practice

The Autism Society Inland Empire developed and facilitates the Colaboración, Liderazgo, Abogacía, Servicio y Educación (CLASE) Community of Practice. Funded by the Department of Developmental Services (DDS), CLASE is a Community of Practice for leaders of groups and non-profit organizations that serve Hispanic and Spanish-speaking individuals and families with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) here in Riverside and San Bernardino Counties.

Educational Equity

Educational equity incorporates ideas of access, opportunity, and need. Students with Autism or Intellectual Disabilities make up 21% of the special education population, yet little is known about this community's issues. Thanks to the Inland Empire Community Foundation for their generosity in funding this project to gather this data. Over 1200 parents living in the Inland Empire participated in the project.

PEERS ®

PEERS (Program for the Education and Enrichment of Relational Skills) is an evidence-based social skills program for motivated youth interested in learning new ways of making and keeping friends. Thanks to the RAP Foundation, this program was offered to teens and adults in the Coachella Valley with Spanish language interpretation available.

Our Initiatives: Law Enforcement and Safety Training

In 2022, thanks to the generous donations from American Express and Make Waves Foundation, the Autism Society Inland Empire trained 276 First Responders, up from 197 from the previous year. The 276 First Responders represented 37 different agencies in Riverside and Orange County.

Participants attended a two-hour class designed for EMS/Fire/Theme Parks or a four-hour course on deescalation for Law Enforcement.

Our Initiatives: Equity for Alternative Communication Users

Everyone has a right to communicate. Especially in an emergency situation, all of our community needs to have a voice.

With the help of the Ability Central, SymbolStix, and our workgroup of AAC users, family members and professionals, the Autism Society Inland Empire was able to create a lowtech Communication Toolkit. Over 1500 were distributed to First Responders, Department of Social Services Disaster Services for Mass Care and Sheltering efforts, and family members.



Our Initiatives: Remote Employment and Day Services


The Autism Society of California's 2018 Survey showed:

- 51% of adults with Autism have had little or no job exploration
- Only 35% of adults know what kind of job they want
- 32% can identify what type of accommodations they might need

The Autism Society Inland Empire offers paid and unpaid opportunities for adults with Autism and developmental disabilities to explore different types of employment. We have a speaker's bureau for public speaking opportunities, volunteer opportunities at our large events, our Marketplace - free space at our Walks and Holiday parties for those interested in self-employment, and the new Remote Employment Program, which we have partnered with Daivergent to explore over then different careers in the field of remote employment.

Here are some of our goals for 2023. It will be our biggest year yet!

Access to a Diagnosis & Early Intervention

Outreach campaign for marginalized communities on Early Start services and increasing knowledge of medical professionals, pre-school/childcare facilities, and families/caregivers for appropriate diagnoses, treatment, resources.

Leadership Classes for Adults on the Spectrum

15 Inland Regional Center BIPOC community members will have the opportunity to participate in online, in-person, and mentorship training to provide and practice critical advocacy skills and leadership skills, which will increase their ability to advocate for themselves and others in a way that leaves lasting and meaningful change.

Improving Recreation & Inclusion Opportunies in the Community

Recruit at least 20 social recreational programs that can provide services for children/teens/adults ages 3-21 in an integrated service model and train families to navigate to access social recreation services.

Expanding Arts Program

Thanks to the generosity of the Genesis Inspiration Foundation, we will be able to offer a one-week Art Camp for children 8 to 16 yrs and expand our social programs.

• Remote Employment and Adult Services

The California Dept of Developmental Services will be funding training and job exploration for twelve adults in 2023 in the area of remote work.

First Responder Training and Kits

We will be seeking additional funding to continue training First Responders on how to communicate successfully, including de-escalation techniques and our Sensory Kits with tools to help.
