What type of social recreation programs can Regional Center pay for?

Camps: Paying for camps was “suspended” in 2009, meaning regional centers could not pay for them. The good news is as of July 2021, Regional Centers can pay for camps for all ages! Camps may be provided outdoors or in nature. If a portion of the camp is provided indoors, the setting must be integrated with non-disabled peers.

Camps can be either residential camps (overnight camps where the client stays the night) or day camps (the client goes home every day). There are two possible ways Regional Center will pay for camps:

- If the camp is vendored – Regional Center can pay the camp directly. Camp can also be funded as a form of out-of-home respite.
- If the camp is not vendored – Regional Center can reimburse the family for the cost of camp.
- Mileage to and from the camp can be reimbursed.

Contact your Regional Center caseworker to add goals and services to your Individualized Program Plan (IPP). Camps fill up quickly – usually March, however we have no control over other camps. We have included resources which only serve individuals with disabilities as well as those organizations and businesses who may be “friendly” and accepting of our population.

Social Recreation Classes and Services: In 2022 Regional Centers were once again allowed to coordinate and fund social recreation for regional center clients. Social recreation is defined as any opportunity that will allow IRC clients access to public recreational activities for the purpose of developing and enhancing meaningful interpersonal relationships. These activities:

- Should allow opportunities for interaction
- Around and/or integrated with typically functioning peers
- Must be social in nature

Examples of social recreation include swim classes, horseback riding, sports, monthly gym memberships, art classes, special events like dances, Special Olympics, YMCA, and more.

Inland Regional Center has three options to help clients access these services. You can use any or all these options:

1. **Coaches to Support.** Vendored agencies can staff a coach, or the Regional Center client or family can recommend a coach to be hired by the agency to facilitate and teach socialization skills put in the Individualized Service Plan. Parents should handle drop off and pick up. The coach staffing agency does not pay mileage.
 - For minors - the coach can provide 4 hours a day, not to exceed 12 days a month. An optional 2-hour assessment can be provided.
 - For adults - the coach can provide 3 hours a day not to exceed 12 days per month.
2. **Receive a Stipend up to \$100 a month.** This service must be requested to your Regional Center caseworker and added to your Individualized Service Plan (ISP). Monthly stipends to offset the cost of social recreation programs. These costs will be reimbursed to families not to exceed \$100 a month (\$1200 a fiscal year). The stipend is paid through a Fiscal Management System (FMS) after receipts are submitted to receive the reimbursement. This cannot be given a lump sum - it must be done monthly. Any other costs are the responsibility of the parent or Regional Center client.
3. **Choose an organization that is already vendored for these services with Inland Regional Center.** As of May 2023, Inland Regional Center is working with a few organizations to become vendored. If you have a social recreation company that may be interested in becoming vendored, please have them contact the Inland Regional Center's Community Services Department.

Segregated (S) versus Inclusive Programs (I)

Children and adults with Autism need different levels of support depending on their age, their developmental level, and the environment.

A **segregated program (S)** is one where the services are provided in a separate environment even if it is specially designed for a certain group of people. (For example, Special Olympics). We have marked these with an (S) to indicate these.

An **inclusive program (I)** makes sure neurotypical or non-disabled peers (people the same age range) are in the class or program. These programs have usually made changes and modifications in teaching methods, approaches, structures, strategies and possibly the environment with a vision to provide all students in that age range with equitable and participatory learning experience. These changes are usually good for all students and are sometimes called universal design. An example of this would be having a schedule posted so students know what to expect.

Please note, placing children or adults with disabilities in a “typical” class without changes does not constitute inclusion. To set a child up for success strategies need to be designed specific to the child.

We have compiled these resources to help individuals and families make an informed choice about what they would like to participate in. We are not suggesting one type of program is better than the other. We believe decisions should be made based on the wants and needs of the person with Autism and the family and consider the level of support needed.

They will want you to explain your specific issues and worries including waiting in line. You must provide a valid theme park ticket and a photo of the person who requires DAS (disability access service), and the individual must sign and accept the terms and conditions. DAS is valid for up to 60 days, you will need to return to Guest Relations if you wish to have the service re-issued.

The park also has designated quiet areas and a downloadable guide for wheelchair access. Ask for a tag to use your pushchair as a wheelchair or you can hire wheelchairs and pushchairs near the main entrance. Send an email to experience@legoland.com at least two weeks ahead of your visit and the Carlsbad Park can also arrange for American sign language interpreters for shows.

Guests who have difficulty waiting in queue lines may obtain the Attraction Access Pass (AAP). A doctor's note is required for the first time one requests for an AAP, the Six Flags website has a list of what the doctor must include in their note. This note must be brought to the Ride Information Center (Guest Services) just inside the front gate of the park. A photo identification must be presented at the time of issuance. Children under the age of 16 may use a student photo ID, but if the child is 12 and under and does not have a photo ID, the parent's or guardian's ID may be accepted as well.

The park offers amenities such as a **sensory guide**, noise cancelling headphones, and designated quiet rooms. Start at the Guest Services Center to enroll in the Rider Accessibility Program, so that special needs guests and five family members can enjoy priority access to select rides.
